Information about 'The Words Matter' Conference

`The Words Matter` conference was organized by Together in Action with the initiation of Deepak Naik. The goal of the conference was to build awareness on Hate Speech among the youngsters of Coventry.

The need of such conference arose as a result of several incidents around the world.

One of the incidents that triggered the need of `Words Matter` conference is; the Syrian Refugee Crisis. Syrian Civil War has produced the last decades' most populous migration.

Hate Speech reached its peak as the refugees arrived into European shores. Anti-refugee comments started to take place in many countries as well as social media.

For example, Katie Hopkins, a British newspaper columnist's choice of words to describe refugees were found offensive. She used 'cockroaches' term in order to describe asylum seekers¹.

The UK's, referendum to leave European Union has added more tension to the migration problem and discrimination related issues. The referendum came to known as Brexit.

Politicians, such as Nigel Farage whom was a lead supporter of the Leave Campaign, have been condemned for their attitude on migration related issues².

After the success of the Brexit campaign, there has been an increase in Hate Speech and crimes within the UK³. Figures suggests that, hate related crimes has increased by %60 after Brexit⁴.

Another incident that inspired the 'Words Matter' conference, was the USA presidential election campaign. Donald Trump, a real estate tycoon from New York run against US Secretary Hillary Clinton. During his presidential campaign, Trump has angered many groups. Especially his remarks on Latino community has created a lot of speculations. Donald Trump has blamed Latinos for bringing crime to USA and made a generalization on their race by saying the migrants who came to USA are rapist and drug addicts⁵.

Trump also promised to build a wall between Mexico and US. Donald Trump has won the election.

These incidents are the proof of discrimination, xenophobia, anti-refugee propaganda and extremism are on the rise. As a result, more people are receiving offensive comments, being subjected to abuse and become a victim of a hate crime.

'Words Matter' conference tried to inform young people of Coventry about Hate Speech and Crime. The younger people know about the importance of words, the more people they will inform about the cause. The conference delivered with the financial aid from United Religions Initiative (Europe),

Speeches

Hazal Ozaktan



As a Master of Arts graduate from Coventry University and Human Rights activist, Hazal Ozaktan prepared a presentation about the importance of the words. The presentation consisted of 4 main topics. These were; The Freedom of Speech, Hate Speech, Hate Crime and Bullying.

Ms. Ozaktan stated that the Freedom of Speech should not be mistaken as a right to perform Hate Speech and continued by explaining the outcomes of hate speech. Hate Speech wounds its victims on so many levels by creating self-esteem problems to social exclusion. Also it is promoting violence towards the victim. Therefore, hate crimes are born.



Rui Gomes

Rui Gomes, Head of Education and Training, Youth Department from Council of Europe, explained meaning of the Freedom of Speech and its importance on Human Rights context. Nevertheless, the Freedom of Speech does not mean we do not have limits on performing offensive comments towards a person's race, religion, language or sexual orientation. Mr. Gomez also touched upon the explanation of Hate Speech and the objectives of No Hate Speech Movement.

Mike Ainsworth

Chair of the Government Hate Crime Independent Advisory Group, provided information about Hate Crime and its numbers in the UK and what the government has been doing in order to cope with this problem.

Mr. Ainsworth also stated that the UK takes the lead in Europe to keep track of hate crimes and therefore it has a high level of success when it comes to fight against hate crime.

Harriet Crabtree

Ms. Crabtree attended the event as the event was part of the Inter-Faith week. She contributed the event as an inter-faith Network Executive Director. Ms. Crabtree mentioned the necessity of reporting Hate Crimes in order to tackle Hate Crime. In addition, she mentioned the help of True Vision's assistance on reporting Hate Crimes.

Key Outcomes

Over 130 young people aged from 14 to 25, from diverse backgrounds, educational ability and learning setting, attended the Words Matter conference. These young people meaningfully engaged with the subject of Hate Speech/Crime through discussing the value of choosing words wisely. The participants were informed how the words can impact themselves and others. In addition, how words are their currency to a successful and happy life for themselves, their family and the community.

Initial findings from the evaluation survey forms suggest participants valued the contribution of the speakers, methodology of formal and none formal learning and discussion sessions, refreshments and their hope to practise what they had learnt.

The journey to organise Words Matter, had involved 12 Champions (young people trained, supported and resourced to help plan, manage and deliver Words Matter and complete follow up activities). They were presented with certificates, additional resources to help cascade the message of `Words Matterchoose them carefully`.

The Champions, City College and Eden Girls School plan to disseminate the message of Words Matter and Stop Hate with activities such as discussion groups, exhibitions, during assembly and PHSE lessons.

With support from other bodies, Together in Action plan to prepare a resource pack with templates of lesson plans, other student and teacher resources to promote young people appreciate the power of their words and the positive change that can be generated.

Together in action would especially like to thank City Collage, Coventry and United Religions Initiative (Europe) without their support this event could not have taken place.

Table 1: Questionnaire No1 Data

The questionnaire is composed of 2 sections. The first section, which will be referred as questionnaire No1, consists of 10 questions. The second section is questionnaire No.2 and it has 6 questions. The total number of the questionnaires gathered from the conference are 68.

Total 6 columns are used in the table, in order to characterize the answers given. The NA column refers to Not Answered. Although there was no such section, some people chose not to answer some questions or left it blank without noticing. Therefore I created a NA column in order to avoid confusion.




Figure 1: Pie chart of table's 1 data.

The data tabulated in Table1 is collected from the answers given to the Questionnaire No.1. Figure 1 represents a pie chart of the table's 1 data.

As it can been seen from figure 1, the biggest percentage of 22% belongs to Strongly Agree column. Where the rest are equally scattered.




Figure 2: Filled radar of table's 1 data.

Figure 2 can help the reader understand the data better. A Filled Radar was used in figure 2 in order to gain more information about the people's answers. The circular pattern from 1 to 10 represents the questions given in the table [1]. From question 1 up to 6 most people answered Strongly Agree. Whereas from question 7 up to 10 most used answer is Agree with an exception of question 8 were there is a distinct rise on Strongly Agree.

The data shown on the Table 2 is collected from questionnaire section 2. There are total 6 questions in this section and the total questionnaire sheet number is 68.




Figure 3: Pie chart of table's 2 data.

Below in Figure 3 a pie chart is presented with the data of table 2.

It can be seen that there is no distinct answer coming through from this section. The most distinct characteristic of this pie chart is that Strongly Agree and Agree are sharing the same percentage of 21%. Neutral and Disagree columns are more or less the same with only 1% difference. Then follows Strongly Disagree answer with 12% and NA answers with 13%.




Figure 4: Filled radar chart of Table's 2 data.

Figure 4 is a Filled Radar Chart which presents data from the Table 2. As it can be observed from the Figure 4, Strongly Agree is the most selected answer among all six questions. Although Strongly Agree is the most used answer, it makes its peak from 1 to 4. The answers 4 to 6 seem to equally share the Agree answer. NA column makes appearance in question 3 even though it originally did not exist on the questionnaire.
